# How to Sew a Single Tie Elastic Facemask From Rose Costumes


### What you need:

- 4 pieces of non-stretch cotton fabric (or a cotton blend), cut according to the included pattern (at end of guide)
- 1 piece of 1/4" elastic cut to 32"
- Sewing supplies: thread, scissors, pins, clothes iron

Step 1.

Pin the corresponding panel pieces right sides together to create the front and back for the facemask. Sew these corresponding pieces with a 1/4" seam allowance.








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<u>Step 2.</u>

Line up the 2 panels, right sides together. Pin and sew the long edges along the top and bottom of the mask. Turn right side out, then press flat to create a mask with two different sides.







<u>Step 3.</u>

On the short ends of the mask, fold and tuck the raw edges inside the mask opening. Press flat, then sew a top stitch along the entire perimeter of the mask, closing the open edges.





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<u>Step 4:</u>

Fold the short edges over and sew to create a 1/2" wide casing on either end. Thread the length of elastic through the casing using a crochet hook or safety pin in one end of the elastic. Tie the ends together to complete the mask.
